



HOW DO YOU SEE THE PROSPECTS FOR TOBACCO GROWING?









CHALLENGES

Environmental: Climate change Unusual weather patterns Deforestation Soil degradation Americas: Water storage capacity for irrigation

Africa:

Increasing occurrences of cyclones (massive devastation) Lack of government enforcement of regulation

OPPORTUNITIES

Undersupply for main leaf types

Key markets more robust than expected

Resilient growers likely to have good prospects

New types of products/crops



Undersupply:

Burley: Shortage in part due to 2022 marketing issues in Malawi FCV: Main markets produced less in the previous season

Consumption: Key markets for smokeable products remain stable

Growers' resilience: Demand for quality leaf will favour experienced growers

New products:

Some of the leading new products require tobacco – heated tobacco Farming of cannabis could favour tobacco growers



- Tobacco has suffered from lack of advancements in production technology and yield growth compared with other crops
- Is tobacco the only agricultural commodity to produce less yield/hectare today than 50 years ago
- Capital cost have risen substantially and giving advantage to crops requiring lower input/labor cost
- In productive regions with access to alternative crops, growers are very unlikely to return to tobacco production once they stop.



- Future supply growth will rely on areas with challenging production issues and fewer alternative crops opportunities. For example :
- FLUE CURED Zimbabwe (price resistant among rapidly increasing cost of production)
- BURLEY Malawi (foreign exchange limitations, inputs availability)



SOME FINAL CONSIDERATIONS: OPPORTUNITIES



- The world tobacco market remains huge. Significant production will be required for many years and the growers base is shrinking.
- International leaf product industry remains very profitable and leaf supply is critical to its success.
- Manufacturers will pay prices and implement the programs necessary to maintain supply.
- Growing regions that are able to meet the environmental and social demands of the market will find greater opportunities.


